The Campbell Program: Homeland Security

The Social Science concentration in Homeland Security is an interdisciplinary degree, drawing from the areas of Criminal Justice, History, and Government. The courses making up the concentration will relate to the Critical Mission Areas identified in The National Strategy for Homeland Security. The key areas of study are; Intelligence and Warning, Boarder and Transportation Security, Domestic Counterterrorism, Protecting Critical Infrastructure and Key Areas, Defending Against Catastrophic Threats, Emergency Preparedness and Response.

Students will:

- learn the organization & processes of the criminal justice system and will develop a through understanding of the major vocabulary associated with homeland security.
- study domestic and international terrorist organizations and their activities, and learn to recognize major organized crime organizations and their operations.
- gain knowledge in the implementation of major strategies for disaster prevention and management and examine how terrorist organizations are formed both in the USA and abroad.
- examine the major technological advances in detecting and preventing threats to homeland security.

The Extended Campus Approach

Full-time students normally enroll in two classes during each of the five terms offered annually. This six semester hour load qualifies students for financial aid and/or VA education entitlements. Over 700 students earn degrees through Campbell's Extended Campus programs each year.

Campbell University believes that no student should be denied the opportunity for a college education due to lacking the financial means. Low tuition rates at the extended campuses reflect this philosophy. Nearly all full-time students qualify for financial aid.

The Extended Campus Student

Campbell University understands the need for adult learners to seek a balance between the competing priorities of their education, career, family, and military responsibilities.

The average student attending one of the extended campuses will complete 24-30 semester hours per year while attending classes only two nights per week. Classes are scheduled during the evenings, at lunch, and on weekends. Weekday classes meet two nights per week with two class periods each night. Weekend classes meet once per week for 4 hour and 30 minute time periods.

Campbell's Office of Distance Education offers Internet courses each term which provide adult learners additional flexibility in degree completion. Additionally, some campuses have Blended classes which meet one night in the classroom and one night on the Internet.

About Campbell University

Founded in 1887, Campbell University is located in Buies Creek, North Carolina. The largest of the five Baptist colleges, Campbell is also the second largest private university in the state. The University is a member of the Service members Opportunity College and participates fully in SOCAD, SOCMAR, and SOCNAV, which guarantee the transferability of selected credits.
